

94% had been raped or coerced in their lifetime.


42% attempted suicide at some point if they had been raped or coerced.

53% lacked permanent housing.

binge drank on a weekly or daily basis after they were initially attacked.

ONLY of cases of a rape
victim's first attack
ended in a conviction.

reported being affected by historical trauma.



Urban Indian Health Institute uses non-Hispanic whites as a comparison group for American Indian and Alaska Native health outcomes in recognition that this population continues to benefit from structural racism that has created and perpetuated health disparities in the United States.
