- Purpose

Increase the knowledge of Tribal and federal health leaders and stakeholders through the creation and dissemination of a comprehensive profile of the public health system and infrastructure in Indian Country




- Engage tribal leaders, AIAN academics and Area Indian Health Boards, including health professionals and federal agencies
- 291 surveys were distributed
- 134 THOs responded
- Data collected in 2019

The highest reported public health staff needs are for BEHAVIORAL HEALTH PROVIDERS and COMMUNITY HEALTH REPRESENTATIVES






